CONTEXTUAL / NATIONAL UPDATE PALESTINE SHELTER CLUSTER COORDINATION OF THE COORDINATIO

• Gaza:

- Shelter is at the bottom of the priority list for COGAT which is extremely concerning
- Site Focal Point Self-Reporting: Most reported first-priority needs (SMC):
 - Food 65%; Shelter 17%; Household items: 12%
- Data collection is difficult; generating top line figures as well; Advocacy and stepping up external communications.
- Humanitarian aid operations face severe disruptions due to attacks, looting, and Israeli restrictions, making access and delivery extremely difficult.

West Bank:

- The situation in the Northern West Bank has significantly deteriorated in recent days, with marked escalation in military operations across several locations, ongoing restrictions on movement, widespread demolitions, and impacts on civilian infrastructure and residential areas.
- SAG meetings: Feedback on the SAG and Shelter response documents; Co-chairing notes for endorsement
- Donor briefings; HIP consultation session last week of July



GAZA UPDATE

Overview of the situation in Gaza



- **81% of Gaza is currently within "no-go" zones or under displacement orders** (OCHA); Ongoing evacuation orders and shelling continue to worsen the humanitarian situation
- Recent Displacement (15 May- 3 June): **202,675 people newly displaced**, 94,016 displaced in the 3 southern governorates, 108,659 displaced in the 2 northern governorates
 - Total displacement since 18 March: 640,273 individuals
- In Gaza City, the situation is **severely overcrowded**, with no vacant land remaining in the city, People are fleeing and displacing toward the western area (Al-Mina).
- Families are forced to shelter on sidewalks, streets, in every corner, and in any available open space. Residential buildings are severely overcrowded, and many families are sleeping in the open, without access to clean water, sanitation, or basic services.
- Some find refuge in government buildings, unfinished, abandoned, and even damaged buildings. They
 move rubble just to create space, and any semi-standing roof becomes a place to shelter in.
- According to a recent report by SMC depending on "Site Focal Point Self Reporting" assessment conducted during the period 22 to 29 May 2025, the shelter and NFI needs represent 29% of the priorities, and comes in the 2nd and 3rd top priorities after food (65%)

Overview of the situation in Gaza



- Cargo prioritization Meeting on 7th June:
- Currently, only food, health, nutrition supplies, and chlorine are authorized by COGAT. Shelter NFIs are
 not approved yet. Leadership advocacy remains essential to expand the approvals to all humanitarian
 sectors.
- Ashdod is currently the only operational corridor; discussions focused on this route. Other corridors
 may open during the week.
- There was general agreement in ICCG not to prioritize items that are not approved or ready for dispatch. and not to go with expectation .
- The Logistics Cluster raised serious concerns about looting, noting that the majority of recent trucks were looted or remain at high risk of looting.
- Despite this, there was an agreement to prioritize flour, even if looted, with the rationale that flooding the market with flour may help reduce the looting of other essential items in the future.
- The Shelter Cluster highlighted it has a clear understanding of its pipeline and is ready to dispatch, noting specifically that 2,000 SOKs are currently stored in Ashdod and have been internally prioritized within the cluster.

Current Shelter Partners' Respons Shelter Cluster Coordinating Humanitarian Shelter and Settlements

- At the Shelter Cluster level, the response is very limited. There are no available stocks. Current activities are limited to a few individual cases and cash voucher assistance.
- **ACTED** in partnership with **HEKS** and **ACF** conducted a distribution for 45 households with framing kits and SOKs. Additional distribution in partnership with **PARC** is ongoing to replicate this intervention and support an additional 125 families in urgent need of shelter assistance.
- **PHC** completed assessment of 26 sites (19 in Khanyounis and 7 in Gaza) to identify the needs for shelter repairs and infrastructure maintenance, and will continue the assessment of additional 6 sites in West of Gaza.
- Following a successful pilot, ACTED has secured funding to distribute a total of 9,300 clothes kits
 through CVA (tentatively 7,300 in north Gaza and 2,000 in South Gaza, contingent on supplier's
 availability) before 13 July. The main prioritization criteria is targeting newly displaced HHs that fled
 without assets.
- **BLDA** Completed distributing of clothing vouchers to 1,540 children in Gaza, allowing families to choose items directly from the market.

UPDATES From 04 June SAG



- Finalized and endorsed the SAG position paper on Considering The Use of Rental Assistance as of June 2025.
- This position paper sets out why rental assistance is not considered appropriate at this time, including for very vulnerable cases. This recommendation is applicable for both supporting households to access housing units or land (i.e. tent plots/make-shift shelter plots).
- Note the term 'rental assistance' is used rather than 'cash for rent' or 'rental subsidy' because it
 highlights all the other components of rental assistance, such as exit strategy support, tenure support,
 housing living conditions support that 'cash for rent' does not.

IDP Assessment – Updates

- By the time of the meeting, 1,800 surveys had been completed, with expectations to reach 2,500 by week's end.
- ACF has committed to supporting data cleaning, validation, and analysis for the representative sample. ACF will provide the cleaned dataset and preliminary findings by 16–17 June (Estimated)
- Discussions raised whether the full caseload should still be pursued. MoSD, UNRWA, and other partners will internally discuss continuing full data collection.
- Focus will be placed on analyzing the representative sample for cluster-wide use.
- The Shelter Cluster will coordinate with the WASH, FSS, and OCHA clusters to enhance information management (IM) capacity and establish a joint reporting framework, while preserving the autonomy of each cluster in conducting its own analysis and reporting.
- Based on data from the IDPs survey the cluster aims to develop context-relevant, feasible temporary shelter options.



Next Steps

- Cluster team to draft Terms of Reference (ToRs) for the Technical Working Group to develop the guidelines for temporary shelter solutions for the IDPs.
- Partners are requested to share their interest and technical contributions.
- Feasibility considerations (market availability, political context) must guide final recommendations.



Cluster Monitoring Tools – Tools & Plans

- Proposal to standardize 4Ws/5Ws reporting in a quarterly Excel format. Recommendations use an offline Excel tool, circulated quarterly by the cluster IM team
- Will help map who is doing what, where, and with which resources.
- Mapping will cover presence, sectors, stockpiles, logistics, and prepositioning.
- Each agency to nominate a focal point to report regularly.



WB Preparedness Plan – Summary Strategy

- A 2–3 page plan will detail emergency readiness measures for shelter/NFI response in west Bank involving key stakeholders and relevant ministries in coordination.
- Plan includes: priority items, specs, quantities, unit cost, and target areas.
- Geographic focus: Area C, and Northern WB.
- Designed for rapid mobilization in case of displacement (Est. 30,000–50,000 people).



Rental Market Survey – Plan & Methodology

- Purpose: inform rental assistance programs for IDPs and host communities.
- Focus: Tulkarem and Jenin governorates.
- 24 key informant interviews planned over 3 weeks.
- Topics include price trends, security of tenure, protection issues, and housing quality.



Based on the number of people reached over the past six months and the number of people newly displaced during the same period, a thorough analysis—taking all relevant factors into account—indicates that a significant number of people still urgently require shelter assistance.



Gaza Targeting and Priortisation TWG

Kick-off meeting has occurred, structure of guidance agreed, and partners are supporting the writing up of different sections.

Gaza Local Coping Strategies TWG

Kick-off meeting has occurred, topics selected:

- (1) Emergency shelter repairs using covering materials, framing materials and debris
- (2) Household led interventions to adapt damaged buildings as living spaces, using alternative construction materials, and salvaged materials
- (3) Adapting to summer heat (summer interventions) and adapting to flood risks
- (4) Undertaking basic livelihood activities with limited household resources, and coping mechanisms for the most vulnerable individuals (such as persons with disabilities) that may relate to privacy or the integration of shelter with water and sanitation facilities (WASH).

Emergency Shelter Kit - Gaza




Emergency Shelter Kit (ESK) Overview:

- Intended to go past tents and tarps with the provision of framing materials (timber and fixings), a sealing of kit and some tools.
- More flexible than a tent.
- ESK is an emergency shelter which could be incrementally upgraded.
- During the cease fire understood one partner managed to get 1000 kits in following up to understand how these were used by households.

Emergency Shelter Kit (ESK) IEC:

- Outlines techniques to assemble a shelter with ESK.
- Focuses on good principles related to timber construction and maximizing the living space with limited materials.
- Partners can adapt the IEC to their specific programming.







so that the spacing is 60cm and not 120cm. The trusses could be at 60cm spacing too and this would help to strengthen the roof for heavier roof covering.

The roof can also be upgraded, but only with light weight material. For any heavier material, including Corrugated Steel (CGI), the trusses or beams would need to be stronger to support extra weight.



Make window openings at least 45 cm wide and

75 cm in height for escape in the case of fire.

To ensure good cross-ventilation, windows should be at least 40x40 cm on opposite sides.

Adding a minimum of 5cm of insulation to

the walls and roof will also reduce the risk

of very high temperatures in summer.














"Skew nailing" hammer in the nails at a slight angle


Fix the cornes securely. Metal plates from used tin cans can be used.

5x5 timber structures must be braced on all four walls, the corners, and the roof trusses




K-bracing used for door panel. The point of

5x5 Timber: Good Practice



HELPFUL TIP

Once good-quality plastic sheeting is procured, it's essential to fix it in a way that spreads the load, prevents flapping, avoids friction points, and limits heat buildup. To avoid tearing, fixings should be distributed over a wide area.
