

# Mozambique central & southern regions - Shelter & NFI Cluster Updates

## Situation

- The impact figures increased considerably in the last 24hs as the government move forward with initial assessments. This significant increase refers to the new data on the impact of Filipo in Maputo City, where more than 28K people were affected over a total of 56K (50%), due to the heavy rains in a short period of time caused by tropical storm Filipo.

## Key points

- The district and provincial INGD of Inhambane province made a support request to the humanitarian actors, NFI (blankets, mosquito nets, family kits) and shelter supplies (tarps and tools), although this data is under verification as there're differences between the district's and the provincial figures shared.
- So far, in the codes developed in the province of Gaza, no request has been made for support to the humanitarian sanctuaries. This is related to the low impact that the storm had in the province and to the immediate assistance actions being carried out by the local authorities.

## Shelter Cluster activities

- In the provinces of Inhambane and Sofala the shelter cluster continues coordinating with local authorities to identify the humanitarian gaps. On March 15<sup>th</sup> began in the district of Vilankulo, Inhambane province, the firsts multi-sectoral initial assessments that by the end of the 16<sup>th</sup> have already achieved visits to 8 communities of the district, which also included schools and health units.
- In interviews with key informants and through observation, it was confirmed that the storm caused damages to infrastructures and houses, mainly roofs blasting and instability in the foundations of precarious construction houses, built with grass reeds and in some cases CGI sheets.
- The needs assessments will continue Sunday in Inhambane, visiting the district of Inhasoro, the third most affected.
- Next week, needs assessments are also expected to begin in the second most affected district of the province, Marrumbene.
- Partners in Sofala continue working with local authorities to target communities and specific needs.
